

Smith encourages you to express the boldness in you. You'll get the resources and support you need to thrive and to work toward the change you'd like to see in the world.
















Learning at Smith






Five colleges, no limits








A beautiful place to live and learn

Since its founding, Smith has invested in facilities, courses of study and programs that meet the ever-evolving expectations of students as well as the needs of the times. From its earliest days, the Smith campus was designed as a botanic garden so you can immerse yourself in and learn directly from nature. Ford Hall is home to the college's groundbreaking engineering program the first of its kind at a U.S. liberal arts college for women. Art lovers will find their happy place in the Smith College Museum of Art's spectacular galleries and among its more than 27,000 artworks, dating from antiquity to the present. And theatre buffs and dance fans will find plenty of spaces around campus to participate in or simply enjoy a variety of performances, from plays to choreographed shows.



THE INTELLECTUAL HEART OF CAMPUS

Smith's newly renovated Neilson Library, designed by renowned architectural designer Maya Lin, meets all of your expectations for a contemporary academic library. It is a work of art and a state-of-the-art study space equipped with the latest technology, as well as recording studios and maker spaces, to enhance your scholarly work. There are lots of books, too—more than 250,000 at your fingertips. The Sophia Smith Collection—housed on Neilson's third floor—is one of the most extensive archives of women's history in the country, giving you easy access to a remarkable selection of original documents, papers, photographs and other ephemera from some of the world's leading scholars, activists, educators, authors, policy makers and thinkers. And if you just want to take a study break with friends, the library's Compass café is the perfect spot to grab a snack and relax.

Low-income students are eligible for one-time start-up grants of \$1,000, to help with the cost of transitioning to college. Every student has access to Praxis funding to pursue an unpaid internship.



Applying to Smith



START NOW

Smith accepts two applications for first-year admission—the Coalition Application and the Common Application. Both application types receive equal consideration in the admission process. It's free to apply, and we've been test-optional since 2006.

There are three admission plans for first-year applicants: Early Decision I and II, and Regular Decision. Early Decision is binding. Students who choose to apply Early Decision agree to enroll at Smith if admitted and withdraw all applications to other colleges. Early Decision is a good option for students who have determined that Smith is their first-choice college.


